354. x. ANN JULIA PRENTICE, the tenth child and fifth dau. of Hope Henderson and the Rev. Amos Prentice, was b. in Sullivan, Ill., Jan. 6th, 1849; m. Dr. Charles D. Warden, at Coles, Ill., May 22d, 1878. They reside in Terre Haute, Ind.

Mrs. Warden was converted while a child and has since been a consistent member of the M. E. Church. Her public school education was supplemented by a course at Lee's Academy, and completed at the Illinois Female College at Jacksonville, Ill. 301. iii. NATHANIEL HENDERSON, the third child and eldest son of Mary White and James Henderson, was b. near Circleville, O., Dec. 25th, 1811; m. 1st, Martha Bacon, in Greene Co., Ill. She d. May 10th, 1850. M. 2d, Mary Ann Dailey, near Barrs Store, Ill., March 20th, 1860. He d. at that place June 30th, 1863.

With his parents, when seven years of age, Nathaniel Henderson came to Illinois, then a territory, they finally locating north of Apple Creek, in Greene Co., Ill. He remained with them until his marriage. Their first home was seven miles northeast of Greenfield. In 1846 they moved a few miles further northeast, buying a fine farm of about two hundred acres.
